## My 24, Big Meadows Update Jayne Ferrante

In 2003 we embarked on a long term commitment to restore Big Meadow Creek in Sequoia National Forest to promote watershed enhancement and fish habitat, a project that is well underway. This has been our central conservation project for the past four years.

Since the late 1800s the Big Meadows area was used for seasonal grazing of sheep and cattle under private ownership. In the early 1900s the area was bought by the federal government. The first recorded grazing allotment under Forest Service jurisdiction was created in the early 1960s. According to Hume Lake Ranger District personnel and district records the initial check dams were installed at the time the allotment was issued. A map from 1941 shows some gullying in the meadow, and according to stream gauge records from Cedar Grove on December 23, 1955, there is evidence of a rain-on-snow event, which likely increased the gullying in Big Meadows. This same event caused massive flooding in several valley towns.

The goal of the Big Meadows Creek improvement project is to restore 6,100 feet of degraded stream within the meadow to enhance aquatic species habitat while maintaining existing land uses including recreation and grazing. The project will use a restoration technology called "pond and plug," which eliminates the existing down cut channel and redirects stream flow back into stable, historic remnant channels on the meadow surface. This reconnects the channel to its naturally-evolved floodplain. The project would provide the following ecosystem benefits: 1) establish a single-thread, low flow channel, 2) reduce flow peaks and increase/extend summer base-flows, 3) increase in-stream cover and shading, 4) enhance aquatic and terrestrial habitat, 5) improve water quality, and 6) raise the local groundwater level within the meadow.

Jayne's presentation will cover the history of the Big Meadows project, where we are now and what needs to be accomplished. We look forward to seeing you at our May meeting the presentation will start shortly after 7:00PM.

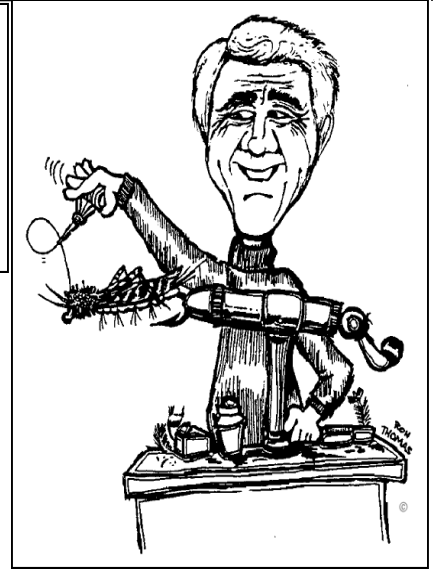

### June 2<sup>nd</sup> American Shad Outing

**\*\* Instruction on tying Shad flies will be given at 6PM (before our May meeting)**

Back in the 1970's, the Department of Fish & Game- thinking they were planting tiny Threadfin Shad- put American Shad in Millerton Lake by mistake. The rest, they say, is history. Millerton Lake is one of only two lakes in the United States that have a sustainable American Shad population. Every year between mid May & late June the American Shad begin their journey from Millerton Lake up the San Joaquin River to spawn. Spawning American Shad from Millerton range between 12"-24" long. The action can be fast & furious for these feisty fish as we intercept them on their way up the river. If you catch it just right, 20 to 30 fish days are possible. The outing this year will be hosted by Bob Papazian & Jeff Trafican. A BBQ lunch & bottled water will be provided stream-side. Call Bob (307-4601) or Jeff (299-0591) for details.

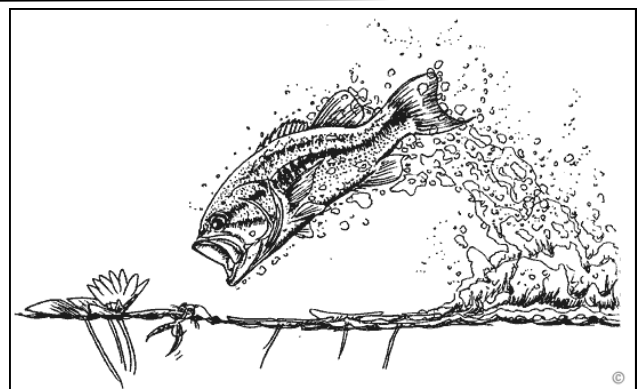
**Directions to the Shad Outing:** From Auberry, go thru town & turn left just past the Elementary School. The sign will say "to North Fork". We'll meet here at **9AM** & walk down to the river together. If you get there late, it's just a ten minute walk down the paved PG&E road from the parking lot to the river. Bring plenty of sunscreen & get ready for a good time!

### Lough Fishing for Brown Trout in Ireland with Frank Reilly

### Kings River Conservancy Volunteer Spring Cleanup Project

#### Choinumni Park Trail Segment

Thank you for volunteering your time to help with this project! Our spring project will enhance an already existing trail along the Kings River, below Pine Flat Dam. The trail begins at the north end of the Choinumni campground and continues along the western bank of the Kings River (between the road and the river). The trail ends at a vehicle access point one mile north. This trail section is accessible from both end points, as well as a few pullouts along the road. The trail is mainly used by hikers and fishing public.

**Clean up dates and time:** Saturday, April 21<sup>st</sup> and Saturday, May 5<sup>th</sup>. We want to get started early to avoid the afternoon heat, so both Saturday's we will meet at 7:30a.m. at the river access parking lot.

**Directions:** Hwy 180 to Piedra Road to Trimmer Springs Road. Turn right on Trimmer Springs Road. Continue to Pine Flat Road and turn right (at the Post Office), continue ½ mile (past Choinumni Park campground entrance) to the green sign "River Access Parking". We will have a KRC sign posted to help you find us! We will have a volunteer liability waiver for you to sign before you start to work. Our workday will end at 12:00 noon.

**What to bring:** Gloves, sun hat, grab sticks, pruning shears, pitchforks, shovels, and pruning loppers. Other suggested items include chain saws and wheelbarrows. Long-sleeved shirts and long pants are suggested to eliminate exposure to poison oak and for insect protection. KRC will furnish trash bags, bottled water and light snacks.

**What we will be doing:** We will focus our time on trail maintenance, removing brush overgrowth, clearing fallen tree limbs on the trail, repairing eroded portions of the existing trail, cleaning and re-setting existing picnic tables, removing graffiti from rocks and signs along the trail-this includes the Indian grinding rocks found along the trail.

We expect to get a lot of work done and have fun while we work! So please feel free to invite your friends or family members who wish to join us to help with this project.
